

## Gloria in excelsis

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to God's people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, H in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

## Collect

All remain standing as the priest says the collect of the day. God of compassion, keep before us the love you have revealed in your Son, who prayed even for his enemies. In our words and deeds help us to be like him, through whom we pray, Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour. Amen.

#### **Psalm:** 37.1–11, 40–41

The verses are said alternately between the reader and the congregation. Please observe a short break at the colon in the middle of each verse.

- Do not vie with the wicked: (pause) 1 or envy those that do wrong;
- For they will soon wither like the grass: (pause) 2 and fade away like the green leaf.
- Trust in the Lord and do good: (pause) 3 and you shall dwell in the land and feed in safe pastures.
- Let the Lord be your delight: (pause) 4 and he will grant you your heart's desire.
- Commit your way to the Lord: (pause) 5 trust him, and he will act.
- He will make your righteousness shine as clear as the light: (pause) 6 and your innocence as the noonday.
- Be still before the Lord, and wait patiently for him: (pause) 7 do not be vexed when someone prospers, when they put their evil purposes to work.
- Let go of anger and abandon wrath: (pause) 8 let not envy move you to do evil.
- For the wicked shall be cut down: (pause) 9 but those who wait for the Lord shall possess the land.
- In a little while the ungodly shall be no more: (*pause*) 10 you will look for them in their place, but they will not be found.
- But the meek shall possess the land: (pause) 11 and enjoy the abundance of peace.
- Deliverance for the righteous shall come from the Lord: (pause) 40 he is their strength in time of trouble.
- The Lord will help them and deliver them: (pause) 41 he will save them from the ungodly and deliver them, because they come to him for refuge.

## Sermon

## Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead,  $\blacksquare$  and the life of the world to come. Amen.

#### The priest pronounces the Absolution

Almighty God, who has promised forgiveness to all who turn to him in faith: ✤ pardon you and set you free from all your sins, strengthen you in all goodness and keep you in eternal life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

## **Greeting of Peace**

The priest introduces the Greeting of Peace with the following words: We are the body of Christ.



Ordinary Sunday 7 C – Sunday 23 February 2025

Genesis 45.3-11; 45.15; Psalm 37.1-11; 37.40-41;1 Corinthians 15.35-50; Luke 6.27-38

Today's gospel continues on from last week's. Jesus now exhorts us to love our enemies, asking what good it is to love only those who already love us. He commands us to be merciful, just as God the Father is. And, perhaps most difficult of all, we are commanded to avoid judging others.

- Pray that we can love so extravagantly that there is absolutely no room for unrestrained judgementalism in our hearts. ray that we can become ever more inclusive, both personally and as a Church.
