We are very glad that you are here and we look forward to getting to know you. Refreshments (tea/coffee), when served, are available in the Parish Hall immediately following the service. The hall can be found by turning left when leaving the church.

Pew Reflections – Anglican Board of Mission

The Last Sunday after Epiphany – Sunday 2nd March 2025

Exodus 34.29-35; Psalm 99; 2 Corinthians 3.12 – 4.2; Luke 9.28-36 [37-43]

In the first part of today's Gospel reading, we learn of a profoundly spiritual experience – the Transfiguration – witnessed by Peter, John and James, where they see Jesus in the midst of Moses and Elijah, the two great Old Testament prophets, and hear the voice of God commanding them to listen to his Son. Peter tries to capture and constrain the experience, 'not knowing what he had said'. [Once down from the mountain, Jesus is back to the mundane work of dealing with people and their problems.]

- May we not try to capture the spiritual as an end to itself, but rather use it to empower us to be getting on with what Christ would have us do.
- Give thanks for the work and witness of the Church of South India.
