Since its earliest days St Paul's has maintained a fine reputation for liturgy and music in the Tractarian tradition.

We are very glad that you are here and we look forward to getting to know you. Refreshments (tea/coffee), when served, are available in the Parish Hall immediately following the service. The hall can be found by turning left when leaving the church.




#### THE GREAT LITANY


'Litany', in Greek, means prayer or supplication but in English it refers to a form of prayer in which there are a series of short petitions said or sung by the priest or cantor to which the congregation makes a number of recurring responses.

Litanies as forms of prayer are very old, dating from before the fourth century, and for a long time constituted a major part of the congregation's participation in the Eucharist. The Great Litany in the Book of Common Prayer derives from the first English Litany, translated from the Latin into English and revised and reworked by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer in 1544.

Please stand as the bell is rung and the choir sings a verse of the Lenten Prose at the West Door. Please kneel for the Litany.

## **Pew Reflections – Anglican Board of Mission**

Lent 1 C – Sunday 9 March 2025

Deuteronomy 26.1-11; Psalm 91.1-2, 9-16; Romans 10.4-13; Luke 4.1-15

Today we see that at the outset of his ministry Jesus retreated to the desert to pray. But he was tempted by the devil, who offered things that appeared to be substantial but that were in fact hollow. Jesus did not let temptation derail him from taking the right path, and in that way he has become a model for us: though tempted and tested, we too can avoid temptation, even when it comes wrapped up in quotations from Scripture.

- Pray for all those who find themselves in positions where they are being spiritually abused, and for those who are perpetrators of spiritual abuse.
- Give thanks for the work and witness of the Anglican Church of Korea.


Names can be added to or removed from the lists at any time.


