This historic church, dedicated to St Paul the Apostle & Martyr, was designed by the Australian colonial architect Edmund Blacket. It had its foundation stone laid on 29 July 1871 and the first service was held in the church on Saturday 27 April 1872. Since its earliest days St Paul's has maintained a fine reputation for liturgy and music in the Tractarian tradition.

We are very glad that you are here and we look forward to getting to know you. Refreshments (tea/coffee), when served, are available in the Parish Hall immediately following the service. The hall can be found by turning left when leaving the church.



THE GREAT LITANY

'Litany', in Greek, means prayer or supplication but in English it refers to a form of prayer in which there are a series of short petitions said or sung by the priest or cantor to which the congregation makes a number of recurring responses.

Litanies as forms of prayer are very old, dating from before the fourth century, and for a long time constituted a major part of the congregation's participation in the Eucharist. The Great Litany in the Book of Common Prayer derives from the first English Litany, translated from the Latin into English and revised and reworked by Thomas Cranmer in 1544.

Please stand as the bell is rung. The Introit is sung from the West Door, following which the choir, servers and clergy process into the Chancel.



Grant us, therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of your dear Son Jesus Christ, and to drink his blood, that we may evermore dwell in him and he in us. Amen.

Confession and Absolution

The priest introduces the confession.







Today we hear the story of a dinner party at the home of Lazarus, Martha and Mary. During the dinner, something odd happens: not only does Mary anoint the feet of Jesus – something a servant would normally do as people arrived for dinner, but she used a whole pound of the very costly unction, wiping his feet with her hair. The expense was about the annual wage for a labourer. Jesus commends her and reproaches Judas, who carped about the cost. Only the best is good enough for God.
