Easter Day

Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead.



The climax of the Christian Year is Easter Day, today, the day of the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. On the evening of that first Easter Day, and a week later - the eighth day, the disciples met in the place where they were to encounter the risen Lord. Similarly, and throughout the ages, Christians have met and celebrated those events week by week, Sunday by Sunday. It does not matter whether a Sunday falls in the Christmas season, or during Lent or in Ordinary Time, it is always celebrated as the resurrection of our Lord.

The liturgy throughout Eastertide encourages us in our celebration over the whole of the Great Fifty Days from Easter Eve until the Feast of Pentecost: Our finest vestments are worn; the Alleluia is added to responses and greetings during the service and at the Greeting of Peace we hear the celebrant proclaim the joyful announcement "Christ is Risen! Alleluia!" Recalling the wonder with which the first disciples heard this news and with our own joy over our redemption, we respond, "He is risen indeed! Alleluia!" (It is traditional that double Alleluias are used from Easter Eve until Low Sunday); and the Paschal Candle, lit at the Easter Vigil, burns brightly in the sanctuary for the whole of the Easter season, reminding us of the real presence of Christ among his people. After it is extinguished on the Feast of Pentecost, this candle is placed beside the font to be lit at baptisms; and is also used at funerals. These are the two rites of passage in which we are brought into direct contact with the death and resurrection of Jesus – the journey from sin and the journey to life.

Above all, Eastertide is characterised by the joy of glorified life and victory over death as shown through our Christian faith which flows from faith in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.





Renewal of Baptismal Vows

As we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ from the dead, we remember that through the paschal mystery we have died and been buried with him in baptism, so that we may rise with him to a new life within the family of his Church. Now that we have completed our observance of Lent, we renew the promises made at our baptism, affirming our allegiance to Christ, and rejecting all that is evil.

Do you turn to Christ? I turn to Christ.

Do you repent of your sins? I repent of my sins.

Do you reject selfish living, and all that is false and unjust? I reject them all.

Do you renounce Satan and all evil? I renounce all that is evil.

Almighty God # deliver you from the powers of darkness, and lead you in the light of Christ to his everlasting kingdom. Amen. I now ask you to affirm as yours the faith of the Church.

Do you believe in God the Father? I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in God the Son?

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead.






