The Second Sunday of Easter – Low Sunday

Although we still hear the title Low Sunday, it is no longer in common usage. Historically, the name was used because this day often pales in excitement and solemnity when contrasted to Easter Day. It also has been suggested that it could have come about because attendance is often 'lower' than on Easter Day, or perhaps that the level of energy of everyone is lower after all the demands of Holy Week! In any case, The Oxford Dictionary of the Christian Church simply notes that Low Sunday is "probably so called in contrast to the 'high' feast of Easter itself."

Previously Easter was regarded as basically a one-day celebration, and that the Sundays following were simply counted as the Sundays after Easter; however, Easter is now seen, not as just one Sunday of festivity, but as seven weeks (50 days) of joyful celebration. Therefore, the proper title for today is The Second Sunday of Easter, in contrast to the former title of The First Sunday after Easter.

Today at St Paul's we will celebrate The Second Sunday of Easter with all of the ceremony this day deserves – a procession to honour our risen Lord; joyful hymns which speak of the Resurrection; double Alleluias to exclaim the joy of glorified life and the victory over death; and the reading of the Gospel which tells of doubting Thomas – when Thomas declares that he must touch the wounds to truly believe that Jesus is alive. The beauty of this Gospel is that when Thomas does meet Jesus in the flesh, he proclaims a perfect profession of faith: "My Lord and my God!"



But you are the same Lord whose nature is always to have mercy. Grant us, therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of your dear Son Jesus Christ, and to drink his blood, that we may evermore dwell in him and he in us. Amen.




