

FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING



Today marks the end of the long season after the Day of Pentecost and it is also the last Sunday of the Church's liturgical calendar. Known as the Feast of Christ the King or Christ the King Sunday, it celebrates the all-embracing authority of Christ as Lord of all things, for in Christ all things began and in Christ all things will be fulfilled. We now find ourselves on the threshold of Advent, the season of hope for Christ's return.

The Feast of Christ the King is a relatively recent addition to the Western liturgical calendar, having been instituted in 1925 by Pope Pius XI for the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church. It has also found its way into the liturgical calendars of a number of other denominations including Anglicans, Lutherans, and The Uniting Church, as well as various branches of the Methodist and Presbyterian churches.

ABOUT TODAY'S INTROIT

At the beginning of the service, as the procession comes into the church, you will hear the cantor and choir exclaim the Royal Acclamations, the *Laudes Regiae*.

This set of acclamations has origins that go as far back as ancient Rome. When Roman leaders such as generals, emperors or consuls entered the Eternal City, triumphantly after a great battle, they were met by the chants of the people.

In later times, the style of acclamations took on a Christian theme, with Christ being the one lauded as King of Kings, but often with various verses also alluding to and acclaiming the temporal rulers of the day.

The *Laudes Regiae* was actually a hymn sung initially in honour of, and in the presence of, the king or emperor. Although the oldest set of acclamations dates from the 8th century, the time of Charlemagne, a number of various forms were used in several contexts throughout the Middle Ages. In the 11th century a manuscript of the *Laudes Regiae* was brought to Old Sarum (Salisbury) by Osmund, second Bishop of that city.

The version you will hear today, although sung in the original Latin, is based on a modern edition which has been transcribed into Gregorian notation by our Director of Music, David Russell, and some of the text has been adapted for use with Advent in mind.

The music, edited by Christopher Dearnley (1930-2000), was written before the Norman Conquest and provides a dramatic and declamatory opening to our Choral Eucharist for the Feast of Christ the King.

May the kingdom of Christ come! Thanks be to God. Amen.
